Uniform Reminders

As the weather cools, our students will, of course, be wearing some warmer clothes. I wanted to give a couple reminders about uniforms on campus.

First Grade

This week, we will further explore different habitats and the animals that live there, with an eve toward their adaptations that enable them to survive where they live. On Wednesday we will begin our last line of inquiry on how changes in habitats may be related to human activity, and we will base our explorations on books like *El gran* capoquero and biographies of Wangari Maathai. As we move through these lines of inquiry, we are expanding our perspective on this unit's central idea: Natural laws impact methods of human organization. We will explore how the decisions we make as humans may lead to changes in the environment and the habitats of other living beings. At the end of the week, our formative assessment on the line of inquiry will be to decide on personal actions we can take to minimize harmful effects of our activities. Our Spanish vocabulary words are desierto, selva, tropical, zona, polar,

pradera. With those words, we will continue learning about nouns and their corresponding articles and learn about the difference between singular and plural nouns. Our English spelling words are ten, hat, hot, sand, hand, under.

In math, we will take our Unit 3 assessment and begin Unit 4. To get an overview of the unit, you can click here and access the introduction. We will start the week reviewing the basics of how temperature is marked on a thermometer, and we will introduce "math messages," which are similar to our morning activity messages. We'll then work with non-standard measurements before learning how to measure by standard inches and feet. For read alouds, we'll enjoy books like <u>Inch by Inch</u> and <u>How</u> Tall, How Short, How Far Away?.




