Teachers are not required to hold conferences outside these dates, so please do not plan on using these dates as an extension of Thanksgiving Break.

Interim Testing Begins

Testing in English reading an English math are conducted 3 times per year. This measures language and math transference (as these are mostly taught in their non-native language, Spanish). This data lets us know which kids need additional, specific help in English in these areas.

We will begin our second testing window today, **6 November and end on 30 November.** It is imperative your child is present for his/her specific testing dates/times. Your teacher will supply you with these dates in her newsletter article.

You will receive the data from these assessments shortly after they are completed. Of course, please remember when reviewing these data that we need to consider them in the context of our immersion program. That is to say, when we see a "percentile" score in reading, remember this percentile is comparing your child's reading in English to other students nationally who are not in a Spanish immersion program. Thus, we should expect our percentiles to be a bit lower than, say, an English only school (at least in the lower grades). That said, "normal" scores on a standard percentile are anywhere between 15-85th percentile.

Cootie Control: Keeping Sick Kids Home

We are well into the cold and flu season, and we need to be vigilant about keeping our kids healthy.

Please reinforce the message of washing hands frequently and covering the face when coughing or sneezing.

Additionally, do not send your child to school if he/she has

- A fever of 100 degrees or higher,
- A strong or persistent cough,
- Vomited in the last 24 hours.





If you are contacted by the school office to come pick up your child who is sick at school, **you must pick him/her up within 1 hour.** If you cannot do so, other adults authorized on your enrollment documents will be contacted to pick up. Additionally, your child may not be allowed to report to school the subsequent day if he/she is sent home sick.

While this all sounds so harsh, please remember the goal is to keep our students healthy and well. Thank you for your help!

Cell Phones, Tablets, Etc.

Children at NMIS are permitted to bring to school wireless communication devices, such as cell phones, iPods, tablets, *if the Head of School gives express written permission to do so.* To request that your child be allowed to bring such a device to the school, email the Head of School, and explain why your child needs this device on campus during school hours. Permission may be granted for extreme or compelling reasons only. However, if permission is granted, students may not use or be in direct possession of the devices during school hours. These devices must be powered "off" at all times, and not be on the student's person. They may only be kept in a backpack.

Students who bring such devices to school without advance written permission from the Head of School, or are in possession of them during school hours or have them in a backpack without being powered off will have them confiscated and released only to the student's parent/guardian. Continued violation will result in revocation of the permission granted to carry the device, and or further disciplinary action such as suspension.

Families who elect to send such devices to school with their child bear the sole responsibility for any loss or damage to the device.





This Week's Grade-by-Grade Update

Kindergarten

This week students will begin a new IB Unit and last unit of this trimester of "Who we are". During this unit students will learn about families and what makes their family unique. Students will bring for Show-and-Tell a picture from their family and a picture of a family from a different country and will share what how they are similar and different. We will make a collage of the pictures students bring and will discuss what makes each family different and unique. We will also do a Venn Diagram for similarities and difference from the families in our class and students will do a fun "I see, I think I wonder" from the family collage we will make as we discuss what makes families unique. We will go on a field trip on Friday to Old Town to learn what made NM families unique in the past to quick off our new unit.

In language arts, we will focus on the letter N and syllables with e. We will do many fun reading, writing, and crafts related activities with words that begin with the letter N and syllables with e. We will also begin our new Tesoro Unit of "Las familias."

In math this week, students will learn how to compare numbers using the following symbols: < > = Students will learn hot to play war in centers comparing numbers. You can practice this game at home during the week to reinforce what we are learning in class.

This week students will begin MAP assessments for Math. This week only the class of **Maestra Pedrotty** will be testing on **Thursday 1:30-2:45.** Please make sure your student comes to school on that day to take the assessment. This test is in English so we highly encourage you to practice the following using english language: Recognizing numbers to 100, shapes, addition,



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place value (ones, tens) comparing numbers and graphing specifically using terms such as greater than, less than, equal, since they only receive math instruction in Spanish and lack this Math vocabulary in English and students tend to get stuck even when they already know the math skill. Thank you for all that you do to support us and your students! They are making remarkable growths across all subject areas! :)

First Grade

This week we will begin our third IB Transdisciplinary Unit: How We Express Ourselves. The central idea of this unit is, "Weather and people's beliefs may influence traditions and events." Our first line of inquiry will focus on the weather, and specifically on the characteristics of climate and ways to measure it. We will begin the inquiry by viewing instruments traditionally used to measure and mark the weather and temperature, and then we'll begin learning to track and measure the wind with wind socks and anemometers. We will also take a more poetic look at the wind in our lives by reading the book Blow Away Soon and creating our own gifts to the wind in the natural space just east of the school. If your child has anything from home like seeds, feathers,

shells, or other natural objects that they'd like to bring in for the project, they are welcome to do so.

Next week we will also be visiting the National Weather Service to see how weather conditions are measured and predicted, so we thank you in advance for promptly returning permission slips. Maestra Alisa's class will be going on November 13, and Maestra Arvizu's class will go on November 15.

In the coming weeks, we will also be learning about the connections between climate and traditions, specifically the upcoming traditions in the months of November and December, which ties back to our Central Idea of traditions and events that can arise from weather conditions and people's beliefs. For







example: How do beliefs influence events? Why do we choose certain decorations for holidays like Thanksgiving? Why might many celebrations in December use candles? Guide your child through a conversation on how the weather and traditions might connect to one another during this time of year.

Our high frequency words this week for the line of inquiry will be tiempo, viento, aire, medir, *temporada*. Since most of those words are nouns, we will revisit and learn more about this part of speech. Our English spelling words are hill, bell, fell, ball, fall, will.

In math this week, in conjunction with learning about weather conditions in our IB unit, we will practice reading thermometers and writing out the names of weather conditions that we track during our morning routines. The kids are getting used to saying out loud that the weather is cloudy, rainy, windy, etc., and they will now have the opportunity to practice writing it out. We will also continue exploring data, shapes, and base-10 blocks, and start learning to tell time to the quarter hour.

Maestra Arvizu's class will be taking their short-cycle math assessment (aka MAP) on November 6 from 9:00 to 10:15. Maestra **Alisa's** class will take it on November 8 from 9:00 to 10:15.

Our reading assessment (iStation) will be later in the month: Arvizu: November 27 at 1:30 Alisa: November 29 at 9:00.
