This Week's Grade-by-Grade Update

Kindergarten

This week students will begin brainstorming ways to make a family tree using visuals other than found on a real "tree" to represent their family genealogy. For example, students may choose to use hearts to represent the trunk in their family tree, arms to represent the branches and hands to represent the leaves. The purpose of this activity is to learn to think outside the box and be creative to prepare them for their summative assessment. As part of our summative assessment students will created a family tree, that looks nothing like a tree, but that displays their family on things that represent them. For example, if they are a military family and move a lot their tree will probably have planes instead of leaves and cut out of each state/country they have lived in their trunk. We want to guide each student so that their final "family tree" is a good representation of the members in their family. So in order to do this, we have changed our

show-and -tell theme for next week to the following: Students will bring a picture of 3 things that represent their family. For example, I have a student whose parents are scientists, therefore she will probably bring pictures related to science and animals. If you are a huge Star Wars or Harry Potter fan family that could be included on the things you bring for show and tell. This will help us know how to best help your student, as they brainstorm and try to come up with things they want to use to represent their "family trees." At the end of this week students will take home the drawing of a model of what they would like their family tree to look like. Over the break you can help students do cut outs of the things they want to have on their tree or gather the things they want included. Some students may want their "tree" small, others may want it big so you can discuss with your student the size of the poster they want and bring it to school on





Monday. Some students may want to bring actual things such as cups/forks/jars etc, so keep an open mind and help them gather whatever it is they think best represent their family, you can advice them, but don't change their ideas. Your child is the engineer of this project, you are just the facilitator. Please do no do the tree with them during the break, this project will be completed in class since that is a big part of the grade, all we need from you is a poster and the materials your students chooses. These materials will be due Monday, Nov 26th along with pictures of their family members, including a set of great grandparents for each side. Please do not send pics of uncles and cousins since we are only including, mom and dad, grandparents and one set of great grandparents in their family tree. Students love working on this project! We are excited to help them out all their ideas together the last week of November! •

In language arts, we will focus on the letter D and our Tesoros Unit about the family. Students will practice writing each member of the family and reading family terms in a fun bingo activity.

In math this week, students will learn symmetry in nature. We will make a collage of animals and things we find in nature that show symmetry. We will continue practicing addition.

In science students will be learning about the body and will be making a representation of their body. We will learn spanish vocabulary for the parts of the body and a few major organs such a heart, brain, stomach and lungs.

This week Maestra Tapia's students will be taking their MAP assessment on Monday 1:30-2:45.

We look forward to meet with you for PT Conferences. If you have not downloaded Razz-kids please do so either on your cell or on your student's ipad. We would like for you to bring the device your student uses to show you how to best use it at home for both EN and SP. As we continue with our IB Unit theme of How We Express Ourselves, we will enhance our line of inquiry about the characteristics of climate and measurement of weather with our field trips to the National Weather Service. Maestra Alisa's class will go on Tuesday, and Maestra Arvizu's class will attend on Thursday. Thanks for getting those permission slips in!

In class, we will make "rain" with a watering can and measure it with rain gauges that we create with plastic bottles and metal washers. We will also make predictions and perform experiments with thermometers outside. Students will vocabulary in Spanish as we read about the weather during read alouds and practice our conversation prompts.

Our Spanish vocabulary words are: clima, lluvia, nieve, frío, nube, temperatura. Our English words are: she, ship, shell, dish, wish, pretty. In math, we will practice reading thermometers and then work on developing "good fact habits" through using dominoes to practice addition, and playing games to make addition facts more automatic for students.
