Mill Levy Special "Mail In" Special Election in January -

VOTE YES!

If you live in the APS attendance boundary, you will be receiving a "mail in special election ballot" in January. It is due by **5 February** 2019.





This ballot is for a property tax levy to cover school capital improvements and construction for APS schools. However, even though NMIS is NOT an APS school, <u>NMIS</u> will have access to these funds because APS is the authorizer of our charter.

As such, **NMIS urges you to vote**<u>in favor</u> of this mill levy increase.

Monies we receive will go towards lease and improvements to our new campus on Montgomery.

This election, if approved, will give 53 APS-authorized charter schools over \$106 million over 6 years. For NMIS alone, this means we will receive over \$260,000 per year for 6 years! And because it is a "per student" amount - our allocation will increase each of these 6 years, as we have more and more students join our school.

Uniform Reminder

As we get near an upcoming vacation, it's important for us to "keep focused" and not allow the children to mentally check out too early. This is important to help keep us on-task and not becoming a setting from Lord of the Flies or Children of the Corn.

As such, I wanted to give a quick reminder about student uniforms.

All children must be in uniform at all times.

Tops:

- Uniform polo with logo.
- Undershirts optional but in plain colored sleeves.
- Sweaters, sweatshirts and hoodies are only permitted indoors if they have school logo.

Bottoms

- "School uniform" pants, shorts or skorts in khaki or navy.
- Shorts and skorts must be an appropriate length. No skirts or jumpers.
- Leggings optional but must be in plain color.





 No cargo pants/shorts, corduroy, or capris, even if they come from the school uniform section.

<u>Jackets/Sweaters</u>

 Only jackets and sweaters with school logo from our uniform provider are allowed indoors.

Morning drop off is awesome! Thank you everyone for:

- Keeping the handicap parking spaces clear if you are using the drop-off lane.
- Having your kids ready to exit your car from the driver side before you enter the drop-off zone.
- Moving your car out of the drop-off zone to make room for the next batch of cars.

With the exception of <u>water only</u> - all food and drink may only be consumed in La Plaza and El Patio. This includes snacks, lunches and any holiday festivities.

Updated Front Office Volunteer Sign-In

We have an upgrade with RaptorWare, our volunteer sign-in screening tool. This will help keep our school secure by not allowing authorized people on campus with your students.

Unfortunately, however, this upgrade will require any of our previously authorized volunteers to re-submit your drivers license. This means that, if you are a volunteer, please plan on a little extra time when you arrive for the first time to go through the upgrade process.

Unattended Young Children Left in Vehicles



We have had a couple independent reports of young

children being left in unattended vehicles in the NMIS parking lot in the morning. Do not do this. If NMIS staff finds a vehicle at any time of day with an unattended child on NMIS property, they have been instructed to immediately call 911 and report the license plate of the vehicle. Leaving an unattended child in a vehicle may be considered child abuse.

Update from the Computer Coding Enrichment Class With more than 600,000 computing jobs open nationwide and only 50,000 computer science students graduating each year, educating students in computer science is imperative.

In our Computer Coding Enrichment Class, students are learning the foundations of computer

science like algorithms, loops, and functions and using these foundations to create their own

games, art, and digital stories that they can share – all while developing problem-solving,

collaboration, persistence, and computational thinking skills that will be useful





in any discipline.

Learning to code is just like learning a new language and requires immersion on a regular basis.

Because of this, we encourage students to learn and explore coding at home. The website,

code.org has fantastic courses and hour of code lessons that will help concepts sink in faster. It

also contains programming labs and in which kids can get creative and build their own games and apps!

In just the first trimester of our Computer Coding enrichment class, we have managed to

collectively write over 60,000 lines of code. Let's get excited about coding!

Want to help your child learn code but not sure where to start? Help your child learn more about coding by trying a free online activity as part of the Hour of Code celebration the week of Dec. 3. The code.org website (the same one your children use already during their weekly coding classes at the library) even includes offline, analog projects you can do with younger children to help them visualize how code works.
