Traffic Flow

After School: Day care and Classes/Clubs

There are two "flavors" of after school events at NMIS: Day care and Classes/Clubs.

Day care is provided by an independent contractor: RGEC. They are CYFD-licensed and provide this service at several other schools in Albuquerque. While they do provide enrichment activities while enrolled, their primary purpose is to provide day care for families that

cannot pick their child up at school dismissal.

Classes and Clubs, in contrast, are not daycare. They are subject driven and are an opportunity for a child to do an activity after school based on his/her interest.

Therefore, a child should not be signed up for a class/club because of a need for daycare, but rather because the child is interested in that class.

Classes and clubs will be starting in the next couple weeks. Indeed one is starting this week: Aikido Club.
Instructions on how to register for that club were in last week's newsletter. Shortly you will find a list of many AMAZING similar clubs offered on different days of the week on varying subjects. These have been put together by our After School Programs committee.

Fall Testing and Interventions

This week we will begin our first round of "interim assessments."

These are assessments we do three times per year to measure a child's reading and math progress. The tests we use are:

• K-2 Reading: Istation

• 3-5 Reading: MAP Reading

• K-5 Math: MAP Math

Per our program design, we use this data to track language and math transference into the child's native language of English.It also helps us to identify children in need of additional support in English reading or math. We will then provide that additional support during the school day, beginning at the end of this testing window (it takes about 2-3 weeks to get all the students through this process). At that point you will receive the testing results from your child's teacher. If your child is selected to receive this additional academic support, you will be notified at that time as well.

We will repeat his process again in the Winter and Spring.

This Week's Grade-by-Grade **Update**

Kindergarten

This week students will dive into our IB Unit of "How we Organize Ourselves." Our focus will move from rules to symbols and the community we live in. We will do a fun neighborhood walk where students will draw all symbols they see and we will discuss why we have symbols. Students will create their own symbol for our classroom and for the school. We will also begin drawing and having discussions about what makes a community and why they exist.

In language arts, we will focus on the letter A and will do many fun writing and craft related activities with words that begin with the letter A. We will continue with our "Estrella del dia" and students will continue learning the letters in the alphabet as they sound out and

learn how to write each other's names.

We recommend the following app to reinforce the writing skills your student is learning at school with (yes!) technology: StartDOT http://www.startdothandwriting.co m/

In math this week, we will learn our numbers 5-10 and students will do fun activities related to grouping and counting up to 10. Students will make a small books "Mis numeros" We recommend to practice at home with your students how to write their numbers 1-10 correctly over the week and weekend. Most students struggle reversing their 2s, 3s, 4s and 5s. If not corrected earlier it can take years for your child to write their numbers the





right way so the more practice of writing their numbers correctly the easier it will be for them to go into the teens without getting confused.

Lastly, we would love volunteers who have a level 2 clearance for our neighborhood walk. If you could come please reach out to your teachers ASAP. Let's have a great week!:)

Kinder Violin News: I'm so happy to have met all of the kinder classes this week! As we're getting to know each other, I've shown the students the different rhythms we will be

using all school year. Ask your child to show them to you! This coming week, we'll be learning exercises to help with hand/finger dexterity as well as how to hand the box violin and bow. I will tell your child what to be working on at home every class. You can also listen to the songs we'll be learning this year here: Kinder Songs.

First Grade

As we move through our first IB Unit of Who We Are, we will continue with our line of inquiry on "why we create rules and laws and expectation to follow them." Our focus will shift from learning about rules to learning about laws. The kids will have time to develop their own "laws," and by the end of the week, we will have created our own class constitutions.

In language arts, we will focus more on reading syllabically in Spanish. With practice, this will become easier for the students as they internalize consonant and vowel sounds. This week, our Spanish vocabulary words are quienes, somos, puedo, ir, regla, and ley. We encourage you to make flashcards at home with these words if you have a chance. As you make flashcards of sight words for home, let us suggest making an extra card to play the game Kapow! Kapow gives students fun practice reading sight words. To play, you need 3 or more players. After placing all of the cards into a bag or container, players take turns pulling a card and reading the word aloud. If it's





read correctly, they keep the card. If not, it goes back in the bag. If a player pulls a KAPOW! card, they must pass all of their cards to the next player. Players keep playing until all cards have been pulled out and read. When the bag is empty, the player with the most cards is the winner. Have fun! You can also make a set for English; our spelling words this week are *in*, *is*, *it*, *big*, *did*, *into*, and *its*.

We will also begin practicing our handwriting in our new workbooks. In this age of technology, one might understandably assume that practicing writing is quickly becoming obsolete. However, the simple act of writing helps with brain development. Increased brain activity occurs whenever we use this complex skill in a way that does not happen when we type. This is because writing involves fine motor skills, spatial skills, eye-hand coordination, memory, and planning. As a child, the development of neural connections through writing is incredibly important. It may feel tedious at times, but the payoff of this discipline will be multifold! We would also like to recommend the following app to reinforce these

skills with (yes!) technology: StartDOT

In math this week, we will practice comparing numbers by playing a game called Top-It (*Supéralo* in Spanish), and we'll use the same number cards to practice putting numbers in order. In addition to practicing writing numbers with Arabic numerals, we will also do activities to practice counting with tally marks. Morning routine time will be used to shed more light on how a calendar works, too.

Lastly, we will begin spending time in the media center on Tuesday afternoon for our short cycle math assessments. These computer-based tests will help us gauge progress in English-language math over the course of the year. Each test is one session each. Here we go!

1st Grade Violin News: I'm so glad to see your children again! I've sized the students, here are the current sizes: Violin Sizes. As we review the basics, please have your child listen to "Lightly Row" here, it's the first song we'll be learning this year.

It was great to see so many of you at Back to School Night!
This week we will go deeper into our IB unit, How the World Works, with an overview of tectonic plates and the impact of their movements. We will take a ride on the Magic School bus with the read aloud *El autobús mágico en el interior de la Tierra* and related follow-up activities. Students will also begin working with the science kit on Rocks and Soil, which ties in nicely with our current unit.

In math, we will continue reviewing concepts the students learned last year, including simple addition, subtraction, and number patterns. We will practice with money, using both coins and bills. We recommend practicing at home by giving your child a small group of coins and have him or her find the total value of the coins.

In social studies, we are exploring the physical features of the Earth and learning vocabulary for many landforms. Students will read a related selection called "Entrevista con una geógrafa." The second graders will continue reviewing map skills and work on identifying landforms on maps.

We will have a spelling pretest at the beginning of the week and tests on Fridays. We do practice the words throughout the week but we suggest students study at home as well.

IB: We have introduced the concept of human migration to the students. We are on our first out of 6 total IB units. The theme for this one is **Where We Are in Place and Time** and the Central Idea is "Push and pull factors prompt humans to migrate."

Our first field trip of the year will be to **Casa San Ysidro in Corrales**. Third grade will go on **Thursday**, **September 13th 10am-noon**.

Math: As we await for our Everyday math workbooks, we are reviewing essential skills like addition with carrying, borrowing, skip counting, and solving word problems.

Students took a

Beginning-of-the-Year Assessment. From this assessment, we were able to narrow down what specific skills we needed to review.

Science: Students will begin investigating birds, their habitats,

and their migration patterns. Next week, we will begin working on our short bird report.

Social Studies: In our textbook Comunidades we will read *Dónde* comienzan las comunidades (Where Communities Begin) and *Las* comunidades y su historia (Communities and Their History).

Language Arts: We will read *Éxito en California* and Viviendas en las rocas. The focus will be on human migration patterns and the settling of towns/cities.

Spelling: We will have a spelling pretest at the beginning of the week and tests on Fridays. We do practice the words throughout the week but we suggest students study at home as well.

Welcome back, Everyone! It has Been a delight getting to know your children over these first few weeks!

Our first IB investigation is underway. The children are exploring the theme "How we organize ourselves", with the central idea "Societies make decisions that affect the Earth." Currently they are inquiring into the concept of "waste" and how societies dispose of it. This week the students will investigate our local waste management system. We will construct a miniature landfill in a bottle to see if we can grow something on the top layer. Please send in 1 or 2 liter clear plastic bottles to facilitate this

experiment. Students will do an English writing exercise in which The students will compare and contrast the stories of two women who undertook what they saw as a potential environmental threat to their societies, and took action to solve the problem. The kids will also be transforming trash into something new, then they will write about it in Spanish.

Outside of our IB units, students will continue to work on the basics of sentence structure in English and work on Spanish reading comprehension. This week's English spelling words are: pale, face, crate, clay stray, cane, slate, today, bail, rail, break, ache, drain,





faint, flame, claim, steak, eight mane, graze, grim, plum, cash, neighbor, and railway.
This week in Everyday math, the students will be exploring lines, rays, segments, parallel lines, circles, and how to measure angles.

I am so excited to teach In Language your child the ropes of the Arabic language. 
